FROM PASTOR DIEHL...

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Dear friends in Christ,

Let me begin by expressing gratitude to you all for your many kindnesses in observance of Pastor's Appreciation month in October. Please know that everything was very much appreciated. It remains a privilege to live and serve among you.

And now ... happy November! At the end of this month, we will celebrate our national holiday of Thanksgiving. As we think about Thanksgiving, I have a question: "How can we cultivate a practice of being thankful?"

Take the brief survey below. Circle "True" or "False" for each question. Let's see how you do!

- 1. God hears me speak "Thank you, Lord" too many times. True False
- 2. Other people hear me speak words of "Thanks" often. True False
- 3. I usually hear more complaining throughout the day than not. True False
- 4. I sometimes, or usually, can catch myself complaining. True False
- 5. Complaining can be "catchy". True False
- 6. It is less enjoyable to be around people who complain a lot. True False
- 7. When I hear others complain, I think they could have it worse. True False
- 8. Some people just can't help themselves from not complaining. True False
- 9. "Church people" seem to complain less. True False

Many cancer survivors might share that among the lessons cancer has taught them, one would be to count their blessings every day. With that sentiment in mind, how would you respond to these questions?

- How often do you thank God for the goodness in your life?
- Do you "by nature" have a tendency to complain? ... much? ... too much?
- Is there a connection between possessing a sense of thankfulness and showing appreciation for others?
- Do you have a tendency to take too many blessings for granted?

Every day there are many reasons to be thankful, but instead, often we complain. We whine about the world's ills instead of praising the God who is over it all. We forget what it is like to wander hungry in the wilderness of our discontent.

If you were to make a list, what would be the various types of complaints you make or hear from others? How long do you think that list would be? Could you go an entire day without complaining? ... a week? Who are the people you hear complain frequently? What factors would contribute to such complaining? And, conversely, who are the people you seldom hear complain? Again, what factors influence this trait? Of course, some people have a "right" to complain about certain things. Perhaps life has been anything but fair to them. Can you think of situations where this might be the case?

So, perhaps if we could practice "thankfulness" more regularly it would become a habit. True or deep enjoyment in life begins with thankfulness to God and others for all the love and blessings we receive in relationship with them. I hope you and I can nurture a prayer life of thankfulness. I hope you and I can extend gratitude toward others for the positive impact they make in our lives.

Friends, may God's blessings be with us all as we cultivate thankfulness in this month of harvest and thanksgiving. Thank you for all you do for Mount Calvary Lutheran Church and for your partnership in the Gospel. May you find great joy and peace as you cultivate thankfulness and may you cherish those special traditions with family and friends gathered around gracious and bounteous tables later this month.

CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS



The Congregation Council met Monday evening, October 16, with the following members and staff present: Pastor Diehl, Heather Diehl (Secretary), C.J. Frye, Bill Holtzman, Anabel Jimenez Luna (MCELC Co-Director), Randy and Phyllis Richards, Jessica Rinker (MCELC Co-Director), Roger Rudy, and Laura Ryman. Council members Pat Holleman, Steve Povlish, and Eli Proctor were unable to attend. A summary of Council sharing and decision-making includes the following:

- The ELC Co-Directors reported an enrollment of 45 children, an increase of 5 children since the September report. The Center has also received 17 inquiries regarding childcare. Two new staff members – Jenny Caldwell and Kyrsten Alkire – have been hired to fill vacancies left by two teachers who left the Center. The Center will hold a Halloween Open House Monday evening, October 30, 6:00-7:30 and a candle fundraiser in November. During November, Virginia Department of Education staff will observe ELC's classroom instruction and activities.
- The Christian Education report noted the participation of children in Sunday morning's Children's Church and the start of Confirmation Classes for three youngsters.
- Property Committee chair, C.J. Frye, reported the cleaning of the church's mini-split AC systems and explained that service to the boiler is planned and will be covered by a service contract recently entered into with the company. The newly acquired AED unit will soon be installed in the hallway between the sanctuary building and parish hall.
- Pastor noted these upcoming Youth activities: "Trunk or Treat" (10/31) and the Spaghetti Dinner and Bake Auction (11/19).
- C.J. explained that the Outreach Ministry Taskforce will be exploring volunteer opportunities within the community that can be met through church members. He also noted increasing activity on the church's *Facebook* page and the addition of *Instagram* to our social media presence. He shared additional information regarding "Tithely.com" as a means to offer the option of online giving to the church family.
- "Old Business" included Council members' review of a revised draft of a "Congregation Disaster Preparedness Plan" which reflected edits recommended during discussions of the plan at the September meeting. The final version of this plan will be presented to the congregation during the Annual Meeting in February 2024.
- In other "Old Business," C.J. explained that two contractors were to prepare cost estimates for the renovation of the parsonage's downstairs bathroom. The estimates have not yet been received.
- Under "New Business," Laura Ryman invited Council members and church family members to brainstorm ideas for creating a useable space in the area between the sanctuary building and the parish hall.

A Hymn Story: "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come"

The words of the hymn "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" are from Englishman Henry Alford (1810-1871). Ordained in 1833, Alford began his ministry as a curate, an assistant to the priest of an Episcopal parish. His ministry culminated in his serving as Dean of Canterbury Cathedral. As evidenced by his obviously successful career, Henry was fully dedicated to service in the Church, a desire he demonstrated early in his life, writing in his Bible at age 16:

I do this day in the presence of God and my own soul renew my covenant with God and solemnly determine henceforth to become his and to do his work as far as in me lies.

Hymnody was one of Henry Alford's many interests. He translated and composed a number of hymns which he published in three collections, including *Psalms and Hymns* in 1844. It is in this collection that "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" first appears under the title "After Harvest." Of the hymn's original seven verses, only four remain in general use.



"Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" is sung to a tune named *ST. GEORGE'S, WINDSOR* composed by George Job Elvey (1816-1893). Born into a musical family, George's music training began early as a boy singing in the boys' choir of Canterbury Cathedral where he also received formal training in the Cathedral School and later at the Royal Academy of Music and Oxford University. At nineteen, he was appointed "master of the boys" and organist at Windsor's St. George's Chapel where he served for almost 50 years. The tune's name is obviously in recognition of Elvey's long tenure at St. George's Chapel.


